WHAT ARE DEEPFAKES?

Have you seen funny videos of Abraham Lincoln smiling or George Washington dancing? Or childhood photos appearing to sing popular songs? This fun technology brings history and people to life in surprising ways. But there's another side to it. Instead of someone like Abraham Lincoln, imagine a video of a celebrity endorsing a product—or worse, someone you know asking for money. The video looks real, but is it? What if a machine made it entirely, and the person in the video had no idea?

This is the world of deepfakes, a technology powered by artificial intelligence (AI) that creates fake videos, audio, or images so convincing they can fool even sharp eyes. While deepfakes can be used creatively for entertainment or satire, they also pose significant risks.

Deepfakes can spread misinformation, impersonate people for scams, or damage reputations. A public figure might be shown saying something they never said, influencing opinions or a video of a friend could be faked to trick someone into giving away money. As the technology improves, the consequences grow more serious.

So, how can you spot a deepfake? There are clues if you know what to look for. Often, deepfake videos have glitches—like unnatural facial movements, eyes that don't blink as they should, or lighting that looks off. Audio might also seem strange, with robotic tones or mismatched lipsyncing. It's about noticing the small details that feel wrong.

To protect yourself, start with skepticism. If you see a video or recording that seems odd or makes an urgent request—like asking for money or sensitive information—pause and verify before reacting. Reach out to the person through another method, like calling. For public figures, check reliable news sources to confirm the story.

As deepfake technology evolves, so do tools to fight it. Social media platforms are introducing systems to detect fakes, and experts are working on solutions to make the Internet safer. Staying informed and cautious helps protect us and others from falling victim to these tricks.

Deepfakes might be clever, but with awareness, we can stay ahead. Let's continue exploring this technology together! Awareness is key to keeping us safe in this everchanging digital world.

QUICK DIAL NUMBERS

The following is a list of phone numbers to use when you need help or to get more information. Keep them handy!

- **Dial 4-1-1**: for directory assistance for any number in the United States. It's a good way to get local, national, and 800 numbers. Note: Charges may apply.
- **Dial 5-1-1**: for up-to-date, location-specific, road and weather information on any Interstate, US or state highway in MN, SD, and several adjoining states.
- Dial 6-1-1: for ITC customers to call for new installs, service repairs, disconnects, reconnects, moves, changes, and general information. This call is toll-free from ITC telephone exchanges.
- **Dial 7-1-1**: for users who are deaf, hard of hearing, or speech-impaired so they can have their calls connected using a TTY to a standard phone. Then the operator relays the conversation for the two callers.
- **Dial 8-1-1**: for the National Call Before You Dig number. This number is used to locate underground facilities such as pipelines, telephone wires, or gas lines prior to digging.
- Dial 9-1-1: for emergencies. This number is available to everyone with a working telephone, cell phone, or pay phone.
- **Dial 9-8-8**: for the National Suicide & Crisis Lifeline. This number is to help you through life's challenges, whether you're facing some struggles or need someone to talk to. There are counselors ready to talk to you.
