As we mark 70 years under the Cooperative umbrella, we want to take a moment to talk about our journey and achievements. Over the past year, we've made significant strides in connecting our communities by expanding our state-of-the-art fiber technology to rural areas of Lake County, South Dakota, and western Yellow Medicine County in Minnesota. 

Good evening! I want to thank each of you for attending this year's Annual Meeting. It's wonderful to see you all in the audience, and I look forward to speaking with you after the meeting.

I'm Joel Brandt, the Secretary of your ITC Board of Directors. I represent the District One members from Castlewood, Clear Lake, Estelline, and Goodwin. I represent a portion of the Codington County exchange as well.

As our Cooperative has grown, the district map has also changed. If you look at the map (on the right-hand page), you can see which director represents each area. For Codington, that exchange is broken down into four pieces in four different exchanges. We did this to ensure all the directors represent approximately the same number of members. As your secretary, I am responsible for reporting on the Board of Directors' elections. Four directors were up for election this year, and all ran unopposed. ### **UPCOMING SPAM FILTER CHANGE**

ITC is excited to announce an upgrade to our email filtering platform. These enhancements will boost filter capacity and performance, incorporating the latest updates recommended by our vendor. On average, the spam filtering system ITC uses processes 1.6 million messages per day, with seasonal peaks reaching over 3 million messages daily. Between 50% and 75% of these are flagged as spam or junk. We aim to provide you with a better spam filter experience, as the increased capacity should process messages faster than the current setup.

#### What Does This Mean for You?

- Your Inbox and Settings: Rest assured, the emails in your inbox and other folders will not be affected. All your current spam filter settings, including friends lists and blocked addresses, will be seamlessly migrated to the new platform.
- Quarantine and Historical Message in Spam Filter: Migrating this data would be too costly due to the large volume
  of quarantine and historical messages. However, to ensure you have access to this information during the transition,
  we will provide links to both the old and new spam filters. We will also publish more information about these links
  as the date approaches.


We appreciate your understanding and cooperation as we work to improve your email experience. As the upgrade date approaches, we will provide more updates and detailed instructions.

# MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL MEETING INTERSTATE TELECOMMUNICATIONS COOPERATIVE, INC. SEPTEMBER 30, 2023 - CLEAR LAKE, SOUTH DAKOTA

Warren Brandlee, President of ITC Board of Directors, called the 2023 Annual Meeting to order on Saturday, September 30, 2023, at 10:00 a.m. in Clear Lake, South Dakota. There were a total of 135 registration cards turned in with an estimated attendance of 169.

Those in attendance recited the Pledge of Allegiance, and the invocation was given by Director Susan Robbins.

General Manager Tracy Bandemer announced ten \$50 cash prize winners

Secretary Joel Brandt announced that a quorum existed for the annual meeting, and therefore, the 36th Annual ITC Meeting may proceed. A motion was made by G. Todd Garry of Webster, SD, and seconded by Clifford Ruesink of Castlewood, SD, to waive the reading of the Notice of Meeting and approve the same. Secretary Brandt took a voice vote of those attending the Annual Meeting, and the motion carried.

President Brandlee sought approval of the 2022 Annual Meeting minutes. A motion was made by Clifford Ruesink of Castlewood, SD, and seconded by Richard Berreth of White, SD, to waive the reading of the previous Annual Meeting minutes and approve the same. President Brandlee took a voice vote of those attending the Annual Meeting, and the motion carried.

President Brandlee gave his report regarding the 2023 year for the cooperative. The President expressed his thanks to the directors and employees of the cooperative, together with the dedicated management and staff that provide high-quality services to each member on a daily basis. President Brandlee advised the members of the system's projects to complete fiber expansion in rural Codington County and the City of Ivanhoe, Minnesota. ITC has also started its expansion project for rural east Madison, South Dakota. ITC continues expanding its state-of-theart technology to these rural areas so residents can work efficiently from home. Also, ITC has been working in the region to bridge the digital divide to unserved and underserved areas as a result of being awarded a \$4.9 million Border-to-Border Broadband Grant from the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development. This grant allows ITC to expand its fiber-optic network to rural western Yellow Medicine County, Minnesota, which includes approximately 483 locations. This expansion into western Yellow Medicine County results in a proposed by-law change to be voted on today by the members. This by-law change allows ITC to avoid a significant tax consequence due to the grant dollars received. Today's challenge to bridge the digital divide is similar to the original work needed to bring telephone services to remote areas. ITC's expansion is the solution for rural areas needing a reliable connection. Indeed, it has been life-changing for those residing in rural areas. President Brandlee gave his thanks again to the employees of the cooperative who have contributed their expertise and commitment to the cooperative and the members of the cooperative for supporting the cooperative.

Director Brandt gave the Secretary's Report and thanked all those for attending. Secretary Brandt noted that 2023 began with an Internet speed upgrade for no additional charge to the members. The expansion projects are intended to bridge the digital divide in underserved areas. He also explained the need to vote on the proposed by-law change to add a Competitive Local Exchange Carrier (CLEC) in Minnesota to become a part of the cooperative. The cooperative is financially strong and in a good position to expand its membership benefits to these underserved areas. Secretary Brandt advised that the three incumbent directors, including Penny Krause of District 3, Tom Main of District 5, and Stephanie Sauder of District 6, ran unopposed and, therefore, will serve another 3-year term. Congratulations to each of these board members!

Attorney Todd Boyd, general counsel for ITC, thanked the members for coming to the Annual Meeting and referred to the ballot each member received upon registering. A membership vote is required to see if the ITC members are willing to extend cooperative benefits to the Minnesota

CLEC expansion areas. As already noted, ITC received grants to expand its services to other areas. However, if these new customers are not brought into the cooperative at this time, then ITC will be liable for taxes to be paid on the grant funds received for the expansion. Therefore, Article I, Section 1 regarding Membership, and Article IV, Section 5 regarding Directors in the by-laws will need to be amended to include these new areas as a part of the cooperative hereafter. Attorney Boyd felt this was a Win/Win situation because ITC would be saving a significant amount of taxes, and the new members would begin earning capital credits for services they purchase. The members had no questions for Attorney Boyd, and he subsequently asked each member to mark their ballot and deliver it to a member of the Credentials Committee.

The Treasurer's Report was given by Director Susan Robbins and reflected the increase in Operating Revenues and an increase in Operating Expenses. It was noted that the coop's investment income increased from the year before, but there was less interest expense. The report also reflected an increase in the net margin, and the members were advised of how the cooperative's assets are broken down into different subsections. Director Robbins' chart also reflected the significant decrease in debt owed by the cooperative. A motion was made by Mike McCann of Gary, SD, to approve the Treasurer's Report and seconded by John Hall of Clear Lake, SD. Motion carried.

Manager Tracy Bandemer gave her report, which reflected that there are 68 employees, with two retiring at the end of October. Manager Bandemer's report included a map of the areas currently served by ITC, together with those areas in which the cooperative is expanding. The Connect SD Program brings sustainable high-speed Internet to every home and business in South Dakota. This expansion was broadcast in a program called Market to Market and included sections of Codington and Grant Counties. Manager Bandemer's report also had a chart reflecting the core services provided by the cooperative to its customers, which reflects significant growth in the expansion. Manager Bandemer also explained the ACAM program, which provides significant support dollars for ITC. She also explained the significant increases whenever it is necessary to negotiate new retransmission agreements. The increase in these fees is significant and results in the need for the cooperative to increase its charges to the members. Also, ITC will be making available a streaming service next spring, and her report showed devices that will work with the streaming product. Manager Bandemer's report also included a video regarding the importance of a cooperative.

Furthermore, her report reflected the significant amount of capital credits the cooperative paid out over the past five years to its members. This December, there will be another capital credit payout. If any member has any questions, please call the Clear Lake office or contact your district representative. Thank you again for attending.

President Brandlee asked Attorney Todd Boyd to report the results of the voting as part of the Unfinished Business. Attorney Boyd advised the members that the Credentials Committee had counted the votes, and there were 129 yes votes and 0 no votes. This results in the customers in those expansion areas becoming members of the cooperative. Attorney Boyd also advised the members that the board of directors, pursuant to Article XII, Section 3 of the by-laws, amended Article I, Section 3 regarding Membership and Article IV, Section 4(c) and Section 7 regarding Directors to reflect that the legal definition of a "joint membership" will now refer to "a legally married couple" rather than "husband and wife." These changes in the by-laws will not materially diminish or impair the rights and privileges of the members and, therefore, may be amended by the Board of Directors without a vote of the members being necessary.

President Brandlee asked if there was any new business to come before the Annual Meeting, and there was none.

General Manager Tracy Bandemer announced ten more \$50 cash prize winners. Manager Tracy Bandemer also announced the two winners of the \$500 cash prizes.

A motion was made by Melvin Johnson of Astoria, SD, and seconded by Mel Ries of Watertown, SD, to adjourn. Motion carried.

# 70 Years of



#### 1950's

- » Deuel Telephone Cooperative and Brookings Lake Telephone were organized
- » Efforts were made to secure funding and upgrade facilities to get dial tone to rural locations

#### 1960's

- » Deuel Telephone's newsletter became the Bell Ringer
- » Local calling between exchanges or Extended Area Service (EAS) was introduced

#### 1970's

- » Deuel Telephone replaced their manual switchboards with an automatic analog dialing system
- » Deuel Telephone buried their telephone system, helping prevent outages

#### 1980's

- » Cordless phones became available
- » Deuel Telephone and Brookings Lake consolidated to form Interstate Telecommunications Cooperative, Inc. (ITC) with a new 18-member board

#### 1990's

» ITC became the first commercial company in South Dakota to offer dial-up Internet services

#### 2000's

- » ITC began upgrading to fiber-optics
- » ITC introduced a new video service and expanded their high-speed Internet services



#### **2010's**

- » ITC University was launched
- » ITC had multiple Internet speed upgrades and introduced a Broadband Only Internet package
- » Expansion into underserved areas began



#### 2020's

- » ITC completed upgrading their network to be 100% fiber-optics
- » ITC Stream was introduced to transition out of traditional TV service



- » A major website upgrade took place, which included a new way to contact ITC through LiveChat
- » ITC reached 15.000 Internet customers and continues to grow
